DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2. 24-1208 DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Parks and Recreation Director Heistein provided an overview of key updates on park projects to the board members.

Bay Bluffs Restoration Project - Conservation Florida is working with the State of Florida to draft an agreement between them so we can have an executed grant agreement between the City of Pensacola and Conservation Florida. City of Pensacola will be the sub-recipients of the state grant. Once we have the executed grant agreement we can move forward with the design and community engagement. At the January council meeting, Parks will request City Council to approve a Resolution supporting the award of Florida State funding through a partnership with Conservation Florida. Conservation Florida will then draft an agreement that will be approved at the February meeting by City Council approving the grant funding. The overall intention is to do a robust community engagement process concurrently with the design. Detail on that will be forthcoming.

Vice Chair Borden inquired if the city had been involved in the negotiations that Conservation Florida is conducting on the City's behalf with the state. Also, will there be any type of stipulations regarding the use of grant funds for the project. Director Heistein responded accordingly to comments and questions.

Chairperson Bruni commented that he would like to request to have the design and community engagement meetings regarding the Bay Bluffs project during board meetings. Director Heistein responded accordingly to comment.

Chairperson Bruni commented that the youth soccer league on-line registration opened yesterday which allows city residents the opportunity to register first.

Chairperson Bruni inquired regarding the status of the new field use agreements with the youth sports providers. Director Heistein responded that he is currently meeting with youth sports providers to talk about changes coming for the next year. One of the big changes that is going to be incorporated going forward is moving towards an hourly rate model, as it aligns with industry standards versus a per playing person fee structure. Our goal is to recoup at a higher percentage to cover the costs that we're providing for services to support these leagues.

Board Member Brown inquired if the new field use agreement could include guidelines that require them to report to the board. Director Heistein responded that the new field use agreement will require the youth sports providers to submit an annual report as well as a presentation to the park board.

STAFF REPORTS

3. 24-1209 ROGER SCOTT TENNIS CENTER - BROCK SAKEY

Brock Sakey, Director of Tennis at the Roger Scott Tennis Center brought before the board a presentation (on file with background material) providing an overview of the operation and the programs at the Roger Scott Tennis Center.

Board Member Williams Roper inquired if the courts at Roger Scott Tennis Center have accommodations for the elements. e.g. heat lamps, shade structures. Director of Tennis, Sakey responded the ten courts on the clay courts side have shade structures between every two courts, but nothing for cold elements. On the hard courts, there are no shade structures, but working with the city to have installed. Off the courts are three very large shade structures for the viewers.

Board Member Williams Roper inquired if the courts were equipped with call boxes or anything for someone to call for help. Director of Tennis, Sakey responded no we do not have call boxes, but there are AED Units on each side of the facility.

Vice Chair Borden inquired to the actual number of active members at the tennis center. Director of Tennis, Sakey responded at this moment we have 307 active memberships. Numbers do fluctuate according to the season.

Vice Chair Borden inquired regarding the revenue sharing how that is determined. Director of Tennis, Sakey responded that he will be sending his books to the city at the end of the year. The new fee structure is a set minimum annual fee of \$135,000 plus at end of each year additional fees are paid to city based on the yearly gross revenue.

Board Member Price praised Director of Tennis, Sakey for making sure there's available slots for everyone to play at the tennis center. Chairperson Bruni also praised him for running the tennis center in an incredibly professionally manor.

AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAM

The Afterschool program centers and staff met on Jan 6 for a day of Professional Development. We were able to spend some time learning about handling behaviors in centers from Anna Tedder. She is a behavior specialist from SEDNET. We then talked about calming areas for children as needed. The centers also had time to plan out their months, weeks, and days. The centers were given planning maps that they could continue to use so that we could have more structured programming.

- Planning to attend the National Afterschool Association Conference in Nashville in March with a few Afterschool program employees to gain additional Professional Development. Members of the ECT will be attending also.
- Continue to look at options for professional development of the staff to increase their knowledge and create programming/curriculum for all centers.
- Bins are continuing to be created to hold the programming of Math, Literacy, and STEAM-based activities as well.
- Portable libraries were delivered to the centers so that they will be able to utilize the books in their current centers in all spaces and the new books that will be handed out to them.
- Met with Denise from CDAC to look at next year's program relationship. Brainstormed ideas that might be useful to both sides.
- We are continuing the new schedule in smaller increments 30-40 minutes in each activity with a transition period of 2 minutes (first then next program) and started splitting the kids into smaller groups with more age-appropriate activities.
- We have fully implemented the "I Got Caught" program which is a behavioral-based program allowing the children and the staff to concentrate on the positive behaviors that we see. Both Fricker and Gull Point have prize bins that the children who reach their goal of 10 "I Got Caught Cards" will get to pick from. More prizes were ordered to continue to reward positive behaviors.
- Materials are also in folders separated by age/grade ranges during the tutoring/homework time allowing for easier access to material.
- I am continuing to organize a list of the items that will help make for a more successful Afterschool Program with an educational base that we can implement with the ECT grant. Some of these items have been ordered and will be delivered to the centers in the next week or two.
- Attended the Flight Academy last week with Heather to see how we can implement this with children in our centers. We are looking to allocate a portion of the ECT grant to the Participant Incentives category to supply a scholarship to learning programs.

- Adding and increasing the number of afterschool attendance has been happening at several of the locations over the last couple of weeks. All participants are in SAMIS and attendance is being put in from most centers on a daily basis.
- We are looking at creating a Life Skills-based program in the centers as well allowing for children to learn basic kitchen skills, hygiene skills, work-based learning programs, career fairs, and several other life skills.
- Met with ECT to discuss the upcoming year 3 and extension.
- Implemented more STEAM-based programming in both Fricker and Gull. For example, the kids designed an App on National App Day last week and this week they planned, designed, and engineered a gingerbread house in 3D models (3r-5th). The younger group designed their Gingerbread house on paper with candy options to choose from. On Wednesday, all of the children will be using their "blueprint" and model to create a gingerbread house out of graham crackers. Fricker kids also created a How to Make Hot Chocolate book, organizing and sequencing the steps it takes to make hot chocolate (k-3). The older children designed a Hot Chocolate Shop along with a logo (4-5th). Then all the children transferred their logos to their cups and used the steps from the younger children's books to follow the steps to make Hot Chocolate. More hands-on-based programs will enter all centers over the next couple of weeks.
